Pause for thought...



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A Message from the Headteacher

Dear Parents and Carers

As we head towards the final week of the Spring Term, school has seen some wonderful work going on that has helped to keep us entertained despite the manic weather that has occurred!

This week in Nursery, children have been reading the story of 'Supertato' and his nemesis Evil Pea! The children (and Miss Travis!) have been enjoying creating their own versions of both characters using potatoes and plasticine. Some pictures of these are at the top of the newsletter.

In Reception, children have been reading the story of the Ugly Duckling, looking at the life cycle of the duckling and how it changed. Ask your child to tell you what the 'duckling' changed into.

In Year 1, pupils have been reading the story of the Princess and the Pea. In Science, children have also explored ways in which to help the princess have a waterproof cloak, as hers got wet in the rain. Ask your child to tell you about the properties of different materials and which one was best for the princess's cloak.

In Year 2, pupils have experienced a little of what it was like to be a Victorian child at school. Things were very different on Thursday when they came into school to find all of their desks in rows and had to work in silence. I found it very strange to walk into the classroom only to see all of the children stand up in silence! Ask them why they did this.

In Year 3, children have been writing informal letters to thank our Egyptian visitor for coming and sharing such a fabulous day with them. Some of these will be going onto my 'Wonderwall; which displays fabulous writing from throughout the school.

In Year 4, pupils have worked hard making their very own version of an Egyptian Canopic jar including a clay head. The detail on them is so beautiful and if looked after, will be a treat for them to look back on in the future of something they made during their Egyptian topic.

In Year 5, pupils have been boldly writing letters to the Prime Minister about global warming.

In Year 6, pupils have continued their research on the Vikings and made their own Viking pancakes this week, sharing a recount of how they made them.

All pupils in Years 1-6 took part in an assembly this week from the 'Lily-Jo Project'. The children enjoyed the session with our visitors including videos, songs, dancing and actions to join in with — all on the topic of their mental health.
